The use of projects can be carried out with an entire class or with small groups of children within a school age program. Projects have a complex but flexible framework that use a set of teaching strategies enabling educators to guide children through in-depth studies of real-world topics all while linking together teaching and learning as interactive processes. Projects can be woven into any school age program and support children to feel motivated and actively involved in their own learning leading them to feel like a sense of belonging within their space.
